RESEARCH: Apprenticeships and Internships

Teacher Tip: This activity works best when taught with <u>MU-3.7</u> so students have a foundational understanding of the differences between apprenticeships and internships.

If you're looking for a way to get your foot in the door and learn more about a career field, get hands-on experience, and connect with mentors who can provide guidance, an apprenticeship or internships is a great place to start! In this activity, you will first choose which opportunity you would like to have. Then, you will conduct research on 3 different apprenticeships or internships you can apply for based on your preferences and skills.
